

Public dollars should go to public schools.

That sounds like a perfectly logical condition on government spending of public funding, doesn't it? But did you know that:

- ➢ For the 2022/2003 school year, private schools were given \$491 million in public funding from the provincial government.
- When adjusted for inflation, that figure, nearly half a billion, is more than double the amount that private schools received in 2000-2001.
- > The percentage increases in public funding to private schools over the last 20 years far outstripped the rate of growth in public school funding.
- > Additional public subsidies to private schools and their patrons include:
 - property tax exemptions,
 - tax breaks on donations and tuition, and
 - a child care tax credit on a portion of tuition attributed to recess and lunch supervision.
- While large sums of public dollars are diverted to private schools annually, public schools are struggling with inadequate funding and unmet needs.

So, what should be happening instead?

IPE/BC believes we need to stop spending public dollars on private schools. Parents have a right to send their kids to private schools, but our tax dollars should not fund them. Funding to private schools, which has been increasing at a staggering rate, should be re-allocated to our public school system — a system that welcomes everyone regardless of economic status, background, religion, ethnicity, diverse needs, learning style or location in the province. A quality, inclusive, well-funded public education system is key to a strong democracy.
