Letter of concern sent to the Premier and Minister of Education and Childcare



On June 23rd, IPE/BC wrote to Premier Eby and Minister Singh to express concern about the underfunding of public education in BC. BC now ranks second from the bottom when it comes to the percentage of GPP spend on education in each of the provinces and territories. We received a reply from the Deputy Education Minister on August 7th, however we did not feel that the

response addressed the issues we raised. Therefore, we felt compelled to send a follow up letter, urging government to address the critical need for an increase in public school funding in BC. The correspondence is posted for your information here.

Speaking of private players

As you'll know, IPE/BC believes that our public tax dollars should go to public schools. For the 2024/25 school year, private schools in BC will receive \$571 million, an increase of 14.5% over the previous year. In addition, private schools receive property tax exemptions, tax breaks on donations and tuition, and a child care tax credit on a portion of tuition attributed to recess and lunch supervision. This article, Not hidden but not visible: Government funding of private schools in Canada, will give you a very good idea of tax benefits given to private schools and their clientele, and the lack of democratic accountability, with a particular focus on BC.
