Our hearts are with Tumbler Ridge

Like so many others throughout BC and across the country, we are thinking of the children and youth, families, school staff and broader community in Tumbler Ridge. We know that this horrific tragedy will mark their lives for many years to come. We're also thinking of the school-aged children and their parents in every community in BC as they come to grips with the fact that this horrendous shooting took place in a school, a setting where we all expect that students will be safe each and every day. We appreciate that Premier Eby has assured the community that the secondary students in Tumbler Ridge will be provided with a safe place to learn, rather than having to face a traumatic return to the same school site.

Collectively, we must strive to ensure that the safety and well-being of young people is a priority. They are growing up in a world that is experiencing increased uncertainty and facing very difficult challenges; they need our support more than ever.

**A national strategy for children and youth**

Senator Rosemary Moodie has advanced Bill S-212 which addresses the need for a strategy to “create a cohesive national vision to ensure every child’s safety, well-being and happiness” as well as to identify existing gaps and take action. The Bill is proceeding through the required steps in the Senate and, should it pass third reading there, it will be sent to the House of Commons for MPs to consider.

BC's provincial budget day



Generally, the Throne Speech, provides the context for the Budget Speech that follows. However, rightfully, the [Throne Speech](#) delivered in the legislature on February 12 focused solely on the tragedy in Tumbler Ridge.

The Provincial Budget is set to be tabled on [Tuesday, February 17](#). We'll be watching carefully, hoping the pressing needs in our public schools are addressed. Unfortunately, for too many years, our public school system has not been given the priority it deserves and the [prevailing narrative has become one of cutbacks and losses](#). It's time for a new chapter. We believe that a quality, well-funded, inclusive public education system is key to a thriving society and healthy democracy. We all benefit when the conditions in our public schools are designed to support the success of every student and the funding is there to help make that happen.

Post-secondary funding

Our K-12 education system is not alone in suffering from inadequate funding. The provincial government initially announced a review of post-secondary funding in 2022 but subsequently put it on hold. Last November, it [restarted the process](#) to review the public post-secondary system, including sustainability and affordability. A report with recommendations will be released on March 16.
